COA - Certificate of Appropriateness

Before beginning work outside on your house; i.e., painting, cutting down a tree, building a fence, etc., call the City of Dayton Landmarks at 333-3683. They will issue you a COA if the work meets the requirements for a historic area. Please post the COA in a front window or door so it is visible to inspectors and residents.

Bulk Waste Pick-up

For all large items to be removed from your property or yard waste that has been bagged or bundled call 333-4800 and schedule a pick-up. Pick-ups are currently scheduled for July 26 and August 23. Additional pick-ups will be scheduled during the summer, so call for an appointment.

Emerald Ash Borer



Watch Out for the Emerald Ash Borer! Presentation After OHDS Meeting, July 9, at 8:00 p.m.

According to the City of Dayton arborist, many of the ash trees lining our streets have been infested with the emerald ash borer, which destroys the tree from the inside out in just a few years. A number of ash trees in the District show signs of infestation. To help us take care of our trees, a Master Gardener from the Ohio State University Extension Services will give a short presentation on the emerald ash borer at 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, July 9, following the regular OHDS meeting in the Park Manor Community Room.

The City of Dayton plans to take down any ash trees on the City's tree lawns, which appear to have 25 percent or more of the crown dead, because they are potential hazards. If you have an ash tree in distress on your street, you may report it to Public Works at 333-4800 and request that it be removed. If the tree is on your private property, you will need to arrange for an arborist or tree removal service to take down the tree. The City arborist does not recommend treating the tree if it already shows signs of infestation. The City will provide a list of recommended replacement trees for areas such as the Oregon District that have small spaces for trees, which homeowners may wish to plant. The City does not have the resources to provide replacement trees at this time.

As a reminder, for the safety of pedestrians, residents are asked to keep their street trees trimmed 14 feet above the sidewalks and away from light poles.
