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Let your light shine edition

Be a good neighbor—it may be time for a trim

Who is this poor, obscured neighbor pictured at the left. Thank goodness he has a trusty guide dog to lead him through the Oregon forest. Yes, this is a light-hearted way of reminding you that the trees on your property (including your tree lawn) are your responsibility.

Though the ideal time to trim trees is in the late fall or early winter, think safety first!

Overgrown trees:

- Hide not just the beauty of our decorative and historic streetlights that our volunteer lighting crew works so hard to maintain, but more importantly, they reduce the effectiveness of the light itself.
- Make it extremely difficult to take a walk or a jog throughout the neighborhood without the added exercise of the “duck and weave.”
- Create a sense of insecurity by reducing visibility for pedestrians, as well as people parking their cars.

We can all do our part by following this easy safety check-list!

1. Trees on your property that hang over the sidewalk should be trimmed to a height of at least 13 feet above the sidewalk. This is actually the law, but it’s not hard to follow or remember, without a tape measure! Just think of Graham and Sarah to the left—This is a height that allows a “man of average height” to walk, carrying an umbrella, leaving plenty of clearance.
2. Do you have a historic streetlight in your tree-lawn? Make sure that foliage is trimmed giving your streetlight plenty of room to shine—the street lights are 12 feet tall, so it’s easy to know how much to trim.
3. Call a local arborist. If you’re not confident in your tree trimming abilities, they are there to help. Brown St. neighbor Sara Vice has used Arbor Experts . Call 233-4118 or visit www.arbor-experts.com for more info. Van Buren St. neighbor Ann Heller has been pleased with Marlow Tree Service. You can give Dave Marlow a call at 236-9962 to arrange for an estimate.
4. Be like Motel 6...leave a light on! If everyone puts on their porch light each evening, this also increases visibility in the neighborhood.

We in the ODBA are working on increased lighting and security in the business district. Two additional private security detail are being added to our busy weekend days. I have asked Goodwill Industries to turn on the sidelights of their building at night and they are doing so; this lights the north end of Jackson Street. We are investigating additional lighting where it may be needed. In an online survey conducted recently, an overwhelming majority of folks believed the Oregon Business District to be considered safe, clean and well-lit. The good news about this survey is that it was primarily taken by customers; however, we will work to continually improve lighting and safety as well as to work with the residential district to help improve dark spots in the neighborhood. I know many of us in the residential district love our trees, but many times some of the limbs block light from the ornamental lights and the DP&L pole lights. The ODBA trimmed many branches in the business district in the spring and lighting was improved as a result. If you need help with trimming away branches, we would be glad to help you, so just let me know.

Jeepers, creepers! (A note from the Housing Committee)

Your neighborhood housing committee is busy trying to encourage all to keep their properties in good condition. One of the issues we have noticed is that there are a number of properties with Virginia creeper or ivy not only on the brick, but also going over windows and doors, over gutters and chimneys, and on to the roof. When the growth gets out of control like this, the creeper and /or ivy, will damage the brick, doors, windows, gutter, and roof. Its tendrils will latch to all these things, and damage the mortar, chalk and sealants. According to agricultural websites, Virginia creeper is very hard to kill, especially when it over-takes the house, and the only sure product that works is undiluted, concentrated "Round-Up". Cutting the base of the stems, and letting it die some before pulling it down may also help in limiting the destruction to your property.
